What have we found out?

Access

Cumbernauld has a huge network of paths, but it is difficult to find out information about it

The new town vision of separating the road and path network means that the paths aren't obvious

Feelings of safety is a key concern especially in

There are lots of issues across the access network and we will only be able to fix a small number of them

Habitats

Cumbernauld's local history is very much part of the natural landscape

It is difficult to find good upto-date relevant information about groups and the places they are involved with



There are less resources available to maintain greenspaces, so we need to think differently

Some of Cumbernauld's greenspaces are amazing but there is a lack of awareness of them

Emerging pests and diseases and lack of maintenance are a threat to the habitat network

What are our ideas?

Habitat and Access Network Plans — A list of projects is being created to capture where the project can have the biggest impact on the habitat and access network. These projects can be seen on the project map that accompanies this board.

Nature Ninjas

We plan to run regular weekly and monthly conservation volunteer days to help at sites across Cumbernauld. This crack squad of volunteers will be able to help other community groups for those jobs where many hands make light work.

Invasive Non-Native Species (INNS) removal

INNS are a major threat to Cumbernauld's native wildlife and there is no point removing them unless you are going to do it properly. We need a coordinated removal campaign that spreads out from the most vulnerable sites.


- Training a network of volunteers to recognise and record INN species
